Dance Theatre of Harlem Announces Dates and Programming for its

2026 New York Season at New York City Center

New York, NY — **September 29, 2025** – Dance Theatre of Harlem (DTH), the internationally renowned ballet company celebrated for its trailblazing performances and global reach, proudly announces its 2026 New York season at the **New York City Center**. The program will showcase a dynamic repertoire of beloved classics and bold works, along with the highly anticipated remount of *Firebird*, a ballet the company has not performed in more than 20 years.

The New York season will run at New York City Center, **April 16–19, 2026**. In addition to repertory by Artistic Director Robert Garland (*Higher Ground, New Bach, Nyman String Quartet No. 2*) and works by William Forsythe and Jodie Gates, the season will be anchored by the DTH Signature Classic *Firebird*, set in the Caribbean with choreography by John Taras and dazzling sets and costumes by Geoffrey Holder. On **April 17th**, DTH will host its annual **Vision Gala**, a vital celebration and fundraiser that sustains the company's artistic and educational programming. More details on the Gala will be announced at a later date.

"Dance Theatre of Harlem embodies the transformative power of the arts to connect communities and reimagine traditions," said **Anna Glass, Executive Director**. **Robert Garland, Artistic Director of DTH** added, "this season marks a pivotal moment for Dance Theatre of Harlem. Reviving *Firebird* after two decades is not just a return to an iconic ballet—it is a celebration of renewal, artistry, and connection with audiences across cultures and continents."

As part of a multi-year partnership with the University of North Carolina School of the Arts and the Thomas S. Kenan Institute for the Arts, DTH will welcome students from UNCSA School of Dance as guest artists, performing supporting roles in the *Firebird* cast in New York and at select cities for the global tour. Audiences will be treated to a recording of Stravinsky's classic score performed by the students of the UNCSA Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Mark Norman and released on the university's in-house label, UNCSA Media. Ms. Glass added, "this relationship is a testament to DTH's



rich artistic legacy and pedagogy, but also to the expansive reach of its alumni. We are deeply grateful to our artistic partners, the Geoffrey Holder Estate, UNCSA and the Thomas S. Kenan Institute for the Arts for standing alongside us in this pivotal season."

Mr. Garland shared, "we are not only thrilled to partner with UNCSA and the Thomas S. Kenan Institute for the Arts in the remounting of *Firebird*, but working alongside former DTH Principal dancer and Dean of the School of Dance at UNCSA, Endalyn T. Outlaw, is an added benefit. We look forward to continuing to grow our relationship with UNCSA."
